The Lord wants you to live in His liberty and freedom.

1 Pt. 3:10-12 Whoever would love life and see good days must keep their tongue from evil and their lips from deceitful speech. They must turn from evil and do good; they must seek peace and pursue it. For the eyes of the LORD are on the righteous and His ears are attentive to their prayer, but the face of the LORD is against those who do evil. (NIV)

There is no doubt in my mind that one of the results of 'real life' is that we allow the LORD of all to be LORD of us. This is the practical application of the truth we have been looking at. To experience liberty in this life, we must give up our own life and live in His. The result of that will bring forth real and abundant fruit in our lives. If we fix our eyes on Jesus, then we will see what we need to see. If we hear the truth in Him, then we will say what we need to say. What we look at with our eyes, and what we say with our lips are so very powerful; both for good and for evil. Since our eyes are the windows to our soul, we must be very careful of what we look at and why we are looking. What we bring into our lives will have an effect on us. And the same is true about what we hear and what we say. We have all experienced the verbal attacks of someone else. These words can damage our hearts and many people are struggling today because of words that have been spoken to them or about them. Peter had issues with his speech as well. He was known as the disciple that spoke first and then listened to the Master. Fortunately, he began to be one who listened more as he grew in the LORD, and then spoke the truth of the LORD to others. James, the half-brother of Jesus, put it this way in James 1:19-20 My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry, because human anger does not produce the righteousness that God desires. (NIV)
